


I'm looking forward to some adventure this year and hope to meet more of you out on the track Cheers. Anne

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


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# Our Rail-Sail trip.

It started when I asked a travel agent if we could go to Perth on the Indian Pacific train and return via a small cruise liner, named the Astor. Since the answer was in the affirmative I quickly rang around and gathered three other couples to join us. They were Kate & John Church, Jeffrey & Jeanene Schapel and David & Gloria Foster. Shortly afterwards we discovered that yet another couple (Colin & Trish Goodrich) accompanied by past members Roger & Aileen Foreman would also be on the train with



Because the Indian Pacific train leaves Adelaide in the evening, the company dines its customers first at the Adelaide Wine Centre, then takes them to the train via coach, giving them all a chance to meet each other and saving a lot of bother with luggage and



bookings into the bargain. The journey across to Perth takes two days, with stops at Cook and Rawlinna Station to deliver supplies to the locals. We learned to walk through the carriages to the dining car and the lounge car with legs apart for balance, and the staff went to great pains to ensure that we could sit together for meals. The beds are put down while you are at dinner and the atmosphere in the lounge car was relaxed and fun. The food is delcious. Cook is almost a ghost town these days, the fettlers no longer required on site, but the past is carefully preserved. It had always been a hot place to live and life there was rough and very hard. The old prison cell

(above) was all the proof needed. The stop at Rawlinna, on the other hand was almost romantic. Trestle tables were set up alongside the train, little lanterns cast tiny pools of light and a most delightful meal was served as evening fell. The wine was lovely, the company splendid, stars were shining and we all trooped back aboard feeling as though we had experienced something special

Pulling into Perth East railway station the next morning we were met by the driver of the unfortunately-named d.o.a. bus company, who was to transport us to our hotel. It was here that we said our goodbyes to Trish, Colin, Aileen and Roger and went our separate ways. They went on to have walks in the Perth Mall, a cruise down the Swan River to Fremantle to visit the markets, the Roundhouse and the Maritime Muse-

um, before thoroughly exploring the Bell Tower – even taking turns at ringing the bells. They then went on touring around the South West of WA before flying back to Adelaide.



In the meantime our little group, now accompanied by a few new friends, spent the next day exploring Perth by means of their fabulous free bus system. There are four free CAT buses, going roughly north, south, east and west around Perth and by careful means you can see almost everything. We checked out the view from Kings Park, wandered along the mall to see Perth Pete, and even found ourselves just in time to hear the glockenspeil sound at midday at London Court, where at one end of this exclusive little mall the dragon wins, and at the other end the knights on their white steeds win. We caught glimpses of the WACA from



the buses, had another look at the Kings Park gardens, and had lunch at the newly updated Queens wharf area. If we had only known about the others ringing the bells at roughly the same time..... Dinner that night was at the hotel, we were all tuckered out from leaping about from one bus to another, but it had been an enjoyable day.

The next morning we were collected from

the hotel by another d.o.a. driver who, once again, gave us a scenic tour before settling down to work and transporting us to Fremantle to catch the Astor. As soon as we had parked our luggage at the wharf arrival lounge we took off again, this time on the Fremantle CAT bus system. There are two CAT buses in Fremantle, one for the "tourist

loop" and the other for Fremantle's residential and industrial area. Of course we did the tourist loop TWICE, in case we had missed anything, then piled out to have a delightful lunch sitting at the Fishing Boat Harbour wharf eating seafood chowder or fish and chips.

Boarding the Astor came next. Once again the staff were more than accommodating, They went out of their way to create a table for eight in the dining room, and space in the Lounge for the evening entertainment. The singing and



dancing were very good, and the band (especially the saxophonist) was excellent. Once again we learned to walk with legs spread apart for balance in the 2-3 metre swells. While at sea we relaxed and settled for eating the lovely food, then came the scheduled stop at Esperance.



Due to the swell we were transferred to shore by tender, an experience that was responsible for us all deciding never to be involved in a shipwreck necessitating too much time being spent in a tender awaiting rescue. Most of us then simply spent the day wandering about the pretty town of Esperance as it basked in the sunshine. But Kate & John had decided to take a special tour, which included a look at the recently constructed replica of Stonehenge as it appears in England. Using the ap-

propriate lay lines to bring it into the right position so that the sun shines through the cor-

rect appertures during solstice it was built exactly to scale. Thus we can now see how Stonehenge was when it was first created by the Druids all those years back. That left only Valentine's Day celebrations aboard the Astor to be enjoyed, (note the elaborate fruit carving display) and the final leg of the homeward journey to be enjoyed.

All in all it had been a really interesting and fun trip and we had all enjoyed it despite it having no connection with four


wheel driving at all. It just goes to show that friendship

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# So You Want To "Do The Canning"?

Or diary notes of an eventful trip

I have been encouraged by others to tell of our experiences encountered on a 4WD trip travelling the Canning Stock Route in Western Australia. Late in 2004 Colin & I were invited to join other family members in July 2005.

The line-up:

Mark (Joan & Kevin's younger son) & Fiona,		
with Rohan (9) & Damon (6)	Pajero	Petrol

Joan, Kevin, Bronwyn & David had already travelled the 1800 or so kms Stock Route before, so David was the main organiser, co-ordinator and a great cook. We were to have communal meals to save on fires/gas, pots and pans etc. Colin & I allowed 1 week to get from Adelaide to the start



of the Canning, 3 weeks along the Route and a week to return to Adelaide. All 4 vehicles were to meet at Coolgardie on 2nd July then head to Wiluna by 4 July – the start of the Canning – finishing at Billiluna 3 weeks later. My incentive to go was to have an ice-cream at Billiluna and to see Wolfe Creek crater.

Joan & Kevin's vehicle carried all the spares, tools & fuel for the Pajero and all the fresh food required for the 3 weeks. Mark & Fiona had to fit in all their camping equipment & the 2 children. Bronwyn & David had to fit in their camping equipment, extra fuel, half the "dry/packet" food stuffs and 3 children. We had 2 fridges to house all the vacuum packed meat for the 3 weeks for us all, and half the "dry/packet" foods stuffs, extra fuel & camping equipment.

<u>1 week to go:</u> before departing Adelaide: Bronwyn phones us. Kynan has chicken pox. Not a problem – we've had it – should be fine!

<u>2 days to go (Perth)</u> Kevin's vacuuming Mark's swimming pool, prior to leaving. His new CDMA phone is on the bottom – you know – the sort that doesn't store phone numbers on a SIM card. OK, still have 1 day to buy another phone – now he's paying off 2 phones and doesn't have all the emergency phone numbers lost in the 1st phone. Won't need them will we?

<u>1 day before departure (Adelaide)</u> Why isn't the Autofridge coping with all this meat (\$600.00 worth). Swap fridges? No, put meat in house fridge overnight.

<u>D.Day (Departure Day) 29th June (Adelaide).</u> Meat is now in the Waeco under the large swag and the other stuff in the Autofridge in the back. Leave money for the house sitter to buy a new electric jug seeing as ours blew up last night.

Pt. Wakefield - Yes - the Autofridge is working. Phew!

Pt. Augusta - meet up with Bronwyn & co by chance so we travel together for a while.

<u>30th June</u> Eucla – not happy with the Autofridge – buy Ice to keep the meat cold. Transfer some meat to Bronwyn's fridge (glad we caught up with them).

1st July Autofridge seems to be coping and working now.

<u>2nd July</u> Get to Kalgoorlie and find an auto electrician. Verdict: Auxiliary battery is ok and so is the Autofridge. Yippee. Press on.

<u>Coolgardie Caravan park</u> cabins Kaziah not well now –must be chickenpox. The others arrive bringing the fresh fruit and veg. How many fruit cakes did Joan bring??

<u>3rd July</u> Damn fridges. Meat is now distributed amongst the other fridges and other food is swapped to accommodate this. Fresh foods are repacked and stored in 2 vehicles where there is

some space. The Waeco is now an expensive storage compartment. This should allow the Autofridge to work better.

Leonora Caravan Park Keziah & Talisha aren't feeling well.

4th July Let's get the two girls to the medical centre for assistance – here comes the chickenpox. Did manage to use our Coles fuel dockets here when filling up the tanks – didn't expect that. Arrive at Wiluna for a last fuel fill before starting the CSR. So why is Mark taking so long to fill up? Seems he can't get the fuel into the tank. Drives around Wiluna trying to clear the problem. Damon has an upset tummy. By now the girls are full on with the pox and Bronwyn now is totally committed to nursing them. Leave Wiluna to start the Canning at Well 1.



5th July Remove spare tyre from under our car & put it on the roof rack. Tie up chain with a cable tie. Fix aerial mount. Put solar panel on Autofridge. Swap food from Waeco to Autofridge to see if Waeco will keep milk, dairy & meat cold. Waeco won't work. David managed to get the LED lights working. Good. Autofridge still won't work even with the solar panel on. Have time to fix Colin's clothes bag zip (seeing as the other were still fussing about with our fridges). Have decided to disconnect the little regulator thingy under the bonnet. Autofridge now seems to be cooling – but then so is the outside temp

6th July Thank goodness David knows about electrical stuff. We scrounge a plug from our small compressor to replace the melted one on the Waeco fridge. Can't get the Autofridge temperature below 9° so we swap foods again, close down the

Autofridge and keep the Waeco (under the swag) working. See if you can see it in the picture. Fruit & veg are now suffering and the rot has set in (so to speak). Both girls are now improving and Bronwyn can get a well-deserved good night's sleep soon.

<u>7th July</u> By evening we find a camp site just past Well 15. Use a pack of roast beef for dinner seeing as that one got punctured. Apple crumble for dessert. Yum - looking forward to that. After the crumble fell upside down on the sand there was still enough for a small serve each. No doubt the ants would have a feast on the bits left in the sand.

8th July Did I mention the problems with the fridges? Waeco is off now and the Autofridge temperature has risen to 11° – not looking good. Arrive at Durba Springs. Lovely spot – green grassy areas, plenty of shade, little creek flowing alongside the cliff face AND a toilet. Wow, I can handle that.

9th July This is a great place – plenty of water. Hair wash time, bath time for all. Went sightseeing up the nearby gorge. David has "hard-wired" the Autofridge & fixed the plug on the Waeco. Transfer food again back to the Waeco and switch off the Autofridge. Party time to celebrate the forthcoming birthdays of Kynan, Keziah and Damon. Popcorn, Spag. Bolognese, muffins, marshmallow & presents. Everyone's happy. Was that a spot of rain or wasn't it? Can't be. Well let's just put our big swag in this little tent we borrowed. Hope we put it up properly. Fly doesn't sit right & it's touching the inner tent. Swag fits with a push.



10th July Well the rain started about 5.30am. By 6.50am the water is dripping on the swag and us. Travellers coming in say that much rain has fallen further north for 3 days and most tracks are closed. We are now soaked to the skin; everything is wet. The men try to keep a fire going shielded by 2 hot plates. It's barely alive. Tent city has appeared and everyone is cold and miserable. We make a big batch of soup – using some emergency tinned soup, half dead carrots and other vegetables. It went down well. But it's still raining. I went to bed early to keep warm seems I have mild hypothermia. Now have a dry set of clothes for sleeping and a wet set to wear during the day.

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Patrolling

My boots are wet inside and out. By the way, it's still raining.

11th July Woke early. Still raining. The sleep has helped raise the spirits of everyone. Put on wet clothes from yesterday. Garbags make a wonderful raincoat as long as the water doesn't run down your neck.

10a.m. Rain is easing we can all venture out. I get out my trusty 40y.o. umbrella. The creek along side us has risen but is stable and flowing fast. There's a waterfall about 120mtrs away and pooling at the bottom. Great photo shots. Other travellers arrive and are swamped by campers

shots. Other travellers arrive and are swamped by campers eager to know what it's like further North, further South. Tracks are impassable.

<u>12th July</u> Rain is easing, but we can't move on yet. Use the satellite phone to call Joan & Kevin's other daughter, Annette, who's in Brisbane – get a weather and road report. Will have to stay put for another day. Will make decision tomorrow. Start drying out clothes. Adjust the tent fly so it sits better and turn the swag 90°. Gee it doesn't touch the sides now.

13th July Did a stocktake of our food supplies and the feeling is that we can continue especially as we have a fuel drop waiting for us at Well 23. Take the opportunity to wash clothes, hair & have another bath. Mmm - relax. The ground is drying out.

14th July Did I mention that Joan wasn't feeling well; she's better now. Moving on today.

<u>15th July</u> Woke up to frost on the swag – no wonder my feet were cold. Arrive at Well 23 late in the afternoon. The fuel drums are there waiting for us. Just down the track a bit there is a long puddle in the track. We decide to camp off the road and tackle this in the morning.

16th July Puddle is about 100mtrs long and is passable with care.

17th July Kevin's car has a bit of a wheel rattle – can't be much can it?

18th July Arrive at Kunawaritji Community; refuel cars. Basic foods available. Arrive at Well 34 and Mark has to change a shock absorber –at least he brought some along. We didn't bring any –hope we don't need them. The track leading to and from the community is very corrugated.

19th July Just approaching Well 35 Joan & Kevin's car has blown a radiator hose. Water from Fiona's "washing machine" tub is used to top up the radiator. The car is towed 4km to Well 35 where we have morning tea and assess the damage. Car has a blown motor and won't start. It is then towed 46km back to Well 33 where we can camp and assess the situation. Going slow over corrugations does nothing for the suspension. Thank goodness we weren't that far from the

Community –could have been a problem had we had been further north. Did I mention that I have a sore back & need to rest a bit?

20th July According to the poster at the Community it would cost \$5,500.00 for a truck to come from Port Hedland to tow the car out. David, Colin & Kevin go into the Community and managed to get bits and pieces to weld up a solid tow bar. Nice work by the men; good job David had his own welding rods as the ones available weren't the best. Now when we tow Kevin's car it won't run into the back of ours. The extra

half-day at this spot has allowed myself and the others to rest up and look after the children. After lunch we packed up and left Well 33 heading West for Port Hedland. Mark & Fiona went ahead of us as escort and to advise any oncoming traffic of the slow moving "2/3rds". Bronwyn and David took the food for dinner and went ahead to find a good spot for camping and to get the roast going. Seeing as we were towing Kevin it had to be some place where we could easily drive into and turn around. At the campsite we set about gathering wood for the fire. Mark accidentally got a large splinter in is hand. All was OK until he fainted. At least he was already half sitting down at the time. Couldn't get the splinter out so it will have to stay there for the time being.

21st July New day, bit refreshed; Colin continues to drive. Joan & Kevin are still sitting about 3.5

metres behind – they're getting a good fuel consumption at the moment. We are travelling about 40kph as it's still a dirt road and don't want stones throwing up on the towed car. Finally the road changes to bitumen and we can increase our speed to about 70kph. Mark has decided to seek medical attention for his hand once we get the Port Hedland. Only another day and a half to go. Let's stop for afternoon tea! Kevin checks a back wheel and finds that the shock-absorber has broken in half and has been rubbing on the inside of the tyre. It wouldn't be long before it would have worn right through the tyre. Good job we had decided to stop. Headlight lens and 2 driving lights have been broken -more than likely from stones flicked up. Add that to the cost of repairs.



<u>22nd July</u> Time to move on. Get to Marble Bar at 9.30am. We are still being followed very closely by Joan & Kevin! Not easy to pull up at the fuel bowser but we ease the vehicles in. How lucky can we be? A local (Jim) is sitting watching us. He offers to help (just needs money for phone calls and Joan obliges). Over lunch at the playground, Jim arrives and has organised for the car to be back-freighted from Pt. Hedland to Perth for a very reasonable fee. All Kevin has to do is to contact the person there. How nice some country folk can be. Bronwyn & David go ahead to find the best Caravan Park that we can pull into with the towed vehicle. It's been a long day and a long 3 days towing – about 830kms in all. Colin is quite exhausted. Mind you the fuel consumption is good 16.5 L/100km for 2 vehicles is surely 8.25L/100km each. It's also Kaziah's birthday so we celebrate with fish and chips.

By now all our plans have really gone astray. We are now far from where we should be at this point of our trip. I had no idea we were to see the Pilbara, let alone the Kimberleys. David is anxious to get to Alice Springs as planned. But as luck would have it – his parents, who they are meeting are delayed due to other issues. If we leave tomorrow we should be able to make Alice Springs only one day late.

23rd July We should move on. Colin could do with a break but seeing as Bronwyn has a migraine headache and not feeling at all well it's decided that we have a rest day. Good job we're
