**30 YEARS AGO-1987**

CAMPING AT MT. CRAWFORD FOREST Queen's birthday long weekend June 11- 13, 1988

Following a very wet week we drove to Mt. Crawford Forest in fine weather with patches of sunshine, arriving just after lunch on Saturday. The Goodrich family had arrived on Friday evening to assure our group a good camping area and the use of the "Nissan" hut. The Haverland and Foreman families had already set up camp  
 Saturday afternoon we climbed the peak of Mt Crawford, which was right in front of our camp on Centennial Drive. It was a very steep climb up the side of the mountain and became steeper and very rocky at the top. The view showed some of the extent of the forest as well as glimpses of farmland and reservoir. Returning to camp we enjoyed dinner and a relaxing evening beside the log fire in the hut.  
 During a walk on Sunday morning we searched out the very old cemetery and the ruins of the church which had been destroyed by a bushfire in the 1880's- just 30years after it was built. Back at camp we were joined for the day by the Walton's and Brinkies. After lunch we decided to see if we could find the logging activities that the ranger had told Colin about.  
 It turned out to be quite a distance down the Y.H.A. track before we climbed a hill to see a plaque built by Scouts during an Easter Venture and as we could hear the sound of machinery in the distance we took a "short cut" across the hills. This proved to be quite difficult and steep and some of our group were not convinced it was a short cut but followed because of the enthusiasm of Colin and Bob who were eager to see the logging. Finally, we saw the machine with its large arm and claw working among the fallen trees, picking up huge logs and moving them out to a cleared area along very wet and slippery tracks  
 Activities around the camp included collecting firewood and playing with the football- there were several ideas and methods tried to retrieve the ball from overhanging branches  
 Sunday evening we were joined by Roly and the Beythiens and we enjoyed a pleasant evening by the fire where we were treated to scones baked in the Bedourie by young Stephen Goodrich  
 The weather had been very kind so far but Monday morning we woke to tents billowing in a very strong wind and it was necessary to cook breakfast in the shelter of the hut. It was difficult to fold the tents down in this strong wind but we were keen to pack before the rain that was threatening began. Packing complete we walked up the mountain again, especially for the benefit of those who had not been with us on Saturday afternoon. This time we chose the Heysen trail and it was another enjoyable walk.  
 During lunch the rain began and it was time for us to leave after a very pleasant weekend with good company and a short drive from home.  
 Special thanks to Colin, Tricia and family for introducing us to camping in Mt Crawford Forest – I am sure the first of many visits in the future to this area.

On the weekend of 15<sup>th</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup> June 34 people and 2 dogs from our Nissan Patrol Club spent a couple of happy days at Peake learning and practicing 4WD skills. Being an ordinary weekend participants arrived in dribs and drabs from 4pm on Friday to 8am on Saturday morning. The weather outlook was a bit bleak but the enthusiasm was high. With 9 member and 10 guest vehicles we split into 3 groups ably led by Dave Richards, Craig Wood and Andrew Jackson.



Several new drivers and myself (a slow learner and a new car) under the guidance of our qualified trainer Dave had the opportunity to learn about safety aspects and some recovery methods. After the initial training this group enjoyed tackling the Widow Maker under Dave's guidance and with assistance from John Kerr. The new drivers were very grateful to Dave for imparting the skills and confidence they will need for their future adventures. By the end of the first day we were mostly able to remember the new name Recovery strap which now replaces 'snatch strap'. The name change has been made so

that people don't conclude that all bogged vehicles need to be removed with great force. In fact many bogged vehicles can be extricated by a controlled and steady tow which is the better and safer option. This was demonstrated a few times by AJ's group who were all



experienced 4WD drivers and enjoyed putting their cars against the most difficult sand hills. Craig's clan gallivanted around another area and from all accounts enjoyed themselves immensely.

After lunch Craig and brother, Geoff, organised some driving games which took quite a long time as the officials and hecklers needed to frequently shelter from the rain. There was much hilarity and teasing during the afternoon and the competition was fierce.

The first of these games was to drive over rocky terrain with a bowl of water balancing on the bonnet with the least spilled being the object. Craig was the most steady only losing half the carefully scrutinised amount.

Dave Richards was able to drive up to orange cones with an egg



balanced on the top and be the closest without disturbing the egg in the next game. I think the most fun was had on the final test. The blind-folded driver was guided by their navigator on a short course through sand near the camp ground. Ben most ably guided Elise and then Craig along the track so I hope Craig shared his prize. Some of the keener drivers went out again for a drive in the sand. The rocky ground caused digging the fire pit for cooking the evening meal took to take up the rest of the

afternoon. At least there were a number of supervisors on the job



The evening brought more intermittent rain and we all crowded into the shed to swap stories and stay warm by the camp fire. At one stage we had 3 fires making hot coals for the camp ovens. This was quite time consuming for the oven tenders as the temperature was 6 degrees, the sand was wet and it showered and hailed during the process. Later some of the guests brought out a novel dessert recipe. A waffle ice

cream cone filled with marshmallows and bits of chopped chocolate bars, biscuits and flavoured sauce is wrapped in foil and warmed on the hot coals. The younger people really enjoyed these treats. The ages of the group ranged from 9 to over 70 and we all mingled very well forming new friendships and firming old ones. We welcomed new couples and a family into the club and thank them for their participation in the activities and for their company

Ian and my swags were certainly tested overnight. We hadn't used them in the cold (3deg.) and rain before and fortunately were both warm and dry.

In the morning there was some sunshine and 2 groups went out for another play in the sand hills. We packed while the sun shone and no sooner had we finished than another shower came through. Peake had 6mm of rain each day and was very cold however it's amazing how little the weather mattered and everyone was busy and cheerful and a good weekend was had by all.



Saturday 28 April

Another beautiful morning in this isolated setting. We headed to the heritage listed Cordillo Downs Shearing Shed, once regarded as the largest shearing shed in the world. It was constructed of stone with a curved tin roof and built in 1883 and holds the record of shearing over 85,000 sheep in one season. Unfortunately, at this time, the shed is falling into a state of disrepair with a large section roofless

and entry barred at all openings. We spent some time walking around the building and imagining the conditions under which the shearers worked. The station changed from sheep to cattle in 1942 because the entire previous years lamb drop was taken by dingos. We retraced our path out of Cordillo Downs station and back over the SA/Qld border to the Arrabury Road we drove yesterday. From here we headed north through the Channel Country now showing a hint of green. We stopped at the beautiful Arrabury water hole, a real oasis in the desert, with Spinifex pigeons and very interesting trees lining the water hole. Once mobile again we sighted a dingo further down the road but it was a little elusive and far off to get a good photograph. Upon reaching the turnoff to Haddon Corner we turned and followed the sandy 15km track into the post marking the corner of Queensland and South Australia. The last two sand dunes on this track were quite soft so we decided to unhitch the van. Anne and Ian spotted a monitor lizard crossing the track which was a real highlight. We continued to Deons Lookout for our overnight stay. Wow what a spectacular 360 degree view, with a beautiful sunset, and fortunately no strong wind tonight. Tonight we admired the stars and chatted before a few games of cards.

Sunday 29 April

It came up quite windy this morning and with no clouds the sunrise was not spectacular. Today a 200km drive to Birdsville with our first stop at the Betoota Hotel. The hotel is currently under renovation and is due to reopen in August 2018. A little further along the road we stopped to look at the Dreamtime Serpent an interesting art work done in stone on the side of a hill. This road had some rutting and washouts from the recent rains but this also made the countryside tinged in green. There were a number of birds through this area including Kites and a Brown Falcon. The closer we got to Birdsville the flies became more prevalent. They are small bush flies that land in your drink and all over your food and face even under a fly net! As we drove right past the Birdsville race course on our way into town we stopped and had a look around. It was then time for lunch at the famous Birdsville Bakery but alas they do not open on a Sunday any more. We enjoyed a drink at the Hotel before having a look around the Visitors Information Centre. It was then time to set up camp out of town on the banks of the Diamantina River. This river was in flood only a couple of weeks ago closing the Birdsville track and the Windorah-Birdsville road. A lot of the low lying flood plains around town were still

very water logged. After setting up camp everyone just wanted to rest and enjoy looking out over the river from our shady camping spot. I took a walk back towards town stopping at the track to Pelican Point but this area was still flooded and impassable even on foot. I continued on into town for a look around before heading back to camp. The flies were horrendous in Birdsville, even the locals were wearing their nets!

Monday 30 April

This morning another coolish start but the flies returned quickly. We packed up and headed into town where we bought a couple of pies from the bakery - kangaroo and claret, and their famous curried camel. We fuelled up and then took a walk to the pontoon on the Diamantina River to see if we could see some pelicans but unfortunately there were none to be seen. We looked at the old Royal Hotel ruins in the centre of town and then set off down the Birdsville track. We came across six eagles feasting on an emu carcass. Our next stop was for a delaminated tyre on the rear right hand side of the car. Fortunately we had taken a second spare which we now had to get off the roof of the car. This time we changed the tyre in half the time it took us a couple of days



ago. We were about 80km from Mungerannie so continued on through the vast dry plains spotting another four eagles feasting on some road kill. We passed Lake Howitt with water in it from the recent flood waters in the Diamantina and Warburton Rivers. We arrived in Mungerannie and as we pulled up to set up for the night discovered we had lost the Anderson plug along the track today. Fortunately the hotel had a supply of Anderson plugs and there was an electrician just knocking off for the day who willingly came across to fit a new one for us. We were extremely grateful for this. After tea we went over to the hotel for a chat, a coffee and to watch

the DVD on the life of Tom Kruse the outback mail man.

Tuesday 1 May

We packed and checked our tyre pressures before farewelling Phil, owner of the hotel. He told us the story of the golden arches "Mac Donalds coming soon" sign at the front of the hotel. Apparently some lads had the sign made in Melbourne and then planted it in the Simpson Desert on Aboriginal Land! Unfortunately the elders were upset so it was removed and being taken back to Adelaide to be dumped when Phil said he would have it. We stopped at Cooper Creek camp to stretch and then again at Clayton Wetlands campground. Here there are flushing toilets and an artesian spa and hot showers. The water spurts out of the earth at 98 degrees! We continued through very dry cattle stations until we reached Marree where we looked around town and spent some time at the hotel.

4 Weetbix, crushed  
½ cup raw sugar  
1 tsp bicarb soda  
1 cup boiling water  
1 cup wholemeal SR flour  
2 eggs

In a large bowl, place the Weetbix, sugar, dates and bicarb. Pour in the boiling water, stir well & let sit for 5 mins.

Add the flour and eggs beating well. Pour into a greased loaf pan and bake at 180c for 40-50mins. As a variation add walnuts and cinnamon or mixed spice.
